

I need not have worried. Carlton was a joy and proved to be a blessing for myself. Choice I thought, at least if he has chosen then it cannot all be my fault. So I offered what I thought would be the American staple of bowling or the cinema and being a Saturday I even suggested some football, sorry soccer, and to my surprise he uttered words rarely heard from a teenager -could we go for a walk? As he apparently just loved the green of England and the cool air!

So we set off along the Ribble for his first real taste of Lancashire. He was genuinely intoxicated by the beauty that lay in front of him, peppering me with questions about the river, the fields, the trees, even the birdsong to such an extent that I began to see this stretch of the Ribble through his eyes. And I was called to remember Fr Morris, our old parish priest, who used to describe Sabden as a little piece of heaven on earth.

So in a fit of mid-summer madness I invite you to take a holy pause to thank God for this beautiful valley, to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty.



She gave lots of useful tips for amateur gardeners about potting out and making hanging baskets. She was thanked for a really entertaining talk by the chairman, Mrs Sylvia Davies.

Tramper route has re-opened so hitch a ride

Good news: the Sabden Tramper 'figure-of-eight' route is now fully reopened and restored after heavy rain damaged some parts and forced closure of a small section.

Good News, too, is that there are fabulous views of beautiful Sabden Valley along the tramper-way.

If you love being out in the fresh air, but struggle with mobility, then book the tramper. It's ideal too for families where generations can set off – walk-

ing, talking and tramper-riding. It isn't suitable for children and the 'driver' must be accompanied.

Just dandy at this time of year!

Guess what took over when the bright yellow daffodils finished flowering along the farm road?

Nettles? Grass? Nope. Another bright yellow flowering plant beginning with the letter D. Yep. Dandelions. All the way along one side of the road. A magnificent display, it should be said. The best ever.



And there were thousands of them anywhere and everywhere. Is it my imagination, or have there really been more of the weed this Spring? One of our family, I'm sure, thinks so and isn't too happy about it either! We'll have to blame the wet mild winter for providing perfect growing conditions. Plus in Spring 2023, blame me as I stuck to No-Mow-May for as long as possible. Mowing round clumps of rabbits' (and, yes Dave P, guinea pigs') favourite food.

Anyhow – there's more to the humble, prolific dandelion than I realised. (Are you sitting comfortably? Then I'll begin...) The weed's name originates in France as Dent de lion (lion's teeth) as the jagged toothed leaves resemble the big cat's teeth in its jaw. The little flower is also a symbol of hope, healing and resilience worldwide – there are loads of different varieties in different countries. Dandelions also represent faithfulness and happiness. (Except when there are too many in the lawn...) And I wonder if anyone remembers when, during the Second World War when coffee was almost impossible to buy, the roasted and ground roots of dandelions were used instead!

That's enough of a school day. Let's go farming where all is slowly recovering from the sodden winter. Grass is growing at last, maybe later and slower than usual. Which means that there hasn't been the usual amount of grass for sheep and cattle, and arable farmers haven't been able to plant in waterlogged fields or have seen planted seeds drowned.

One forecast is there'll be a 10% drop in the UK's ability to feed itself. That isn't all down to the rain-soaked winter. Farmers' confidence in the merits of food production is being battered and sheer costs of farming is forcing them to cut back. It's time for everyone to shout out support for farmers. They're guardians of the countryside; carers and nurturers of their animals.

Sophia & Harrison's pedal power raises £1,200

Sophia and Harrison Skellern set themselves a tough challenge when they decided to raise money for a children's charity, the Boparan Charitable Trust.

Eight-year-old Sophia (who was 7 when she undertook the challenge) and brother Harrison (5) wanted to raise money to help other children and when their mum Katie told them about the work the Boparan Trust do they jumped at the opportunity to support children in the UK who are disadvantaged by disability, living with life limiting conditions or in extreme poverty.

They decided that the challenge couldn't be easy or they wouldn't get many sponsorships. They thought cycling 10 miles would be tough but then decided to double it to 20 miles to really push themselves! They completed



the cycle on April 20th in 3 ½ hours (including stops for lunch and treats) and worked really hard getting sponsors and managing to raise the grand total of £1,200.

They received a certificate for their hard work from the grateful charity, and also a headteacher's award at Sabden Primary School where the siblings attend. They are really proud of themselves and are already talking about their next challenge! Well done Sophia and Harrison.




